It was December in 1963 and the country was still mourning the death of President Kennedy one month before. I am sure, if you are my age, you know exactly where you were and what you were doing on that sad day, November 22nd, when the President was shot and died. I was sitting in a 5th grade classroom at St. Peter's School in Parsippany, NJ. Sister Ann Thomas was our teacher.

Christmas was coming and, of course, that meant that school would be closed for about 10 days. So when school dismissed for Christmas break on December 23rd, my friends left excited and happy. My younger brother and I also left, but something was different. We

knew we were not going to return to St Peter's after the New Year. The Merritts were moving to Wayne, N.J. to a new house.

The next day we moved to Wayne and settled into a house with more space, but little furniture, on a road that was not finished. We missed our friends already, but my brothers and I could tell that my parents were excited. Theirs was the typical American story. Get married, settle in an apartment, have a baby (me), save for a house.

On our first night in Wayne, it was snowing like crazy and we were sitting on the sofa in the living room. It was the only place to sit. My mother was overwhelmed with the move and my father was still at work. He had announced that he would have to work 24 hours a day, 7 days a week for the rest of his life to pay the mortgage. We actually believed him. The mortgage, he told us years later, was \$220.00 a month.

As we were sitting there, my mother remembered she had not gotten my father anything for Christmas and she got upset. So the 4 of us put our coats and boots on and walked to the Valley Shopping Center, and bought my father a bottle of his favorite liquor. It was an actual blizzard, and my job was to make sure we did not lose my younger brother, Bill, in a snow drift.

We got home (frozen) and sat down on the couch again. Suddenly the door flew open and in walked the abominable snowman. My father had abandoned his car down the road in a snow bank and walked the rest of the way. He was not very happy, so my mother gave him his Christmas present, which, thankfully, calmed him down.

Being that it was Christmas Eve, at 9:00pm he told us to go to bed. So to bed we went sleeping on the mattresses on the floor ... later we would get beds! I could hear my father and mother talking downstairs about something, but soon I fell asleep.

Waking up, my brothers and I were surprised to see that Christmas had arrived in Wayne. There was a tree and presents and the Yule Log was on the portable black and white TV. The famous Yule Log movie where the cat walks across the screen unsolicited. My old man was asleep in a chair and my mother was in the kitchen cooking something.

What I remember most was thinking, how did they do this? Where did the tree come from? How did they decorate it and when did they find the time and money to buy some gifts?

Then it dawned on me: ***When you care about others, nothing is too hard or impossible. You do what needs to be done because you care.***

I will never forget our first Christmas in Wayne and, of course, my father complaining about the monthly mortgage payment for the next 30 years.

All was good.


Thank you to everyone who participated in these two Christmas projects. They certainly show our Spartan Spirit. May you have a happy, healthy Christmas.
